- Match Tip: IT Staff As Match—You may count the hourly rate and benefits of IT staff (or other staff) when they set up and/or maintain any tech purchased by GU, when they provide technical assistance, and when they train GEAR UP staff. Any equipment or supplies that they provide are allowable as match.
