- Are you a Dual Credit or Running Start Student Experiencing Foster Care? The ETV Dual Credit application is for students enrolled in an eligible program earning a high school diploma and taking college credits toward a degree at an accredited college or university. Students may be eligible to receive up to \$2,000 per academic year (fall, winter, and spring) to help with expenses such as books, fees, supplies, and transportation.
- <u>Empowered Voices Scholarship.</u> \$1000 scholarships for students of color and first-generation college students who are interested in learning about communications majors or careers. Due Jun. 30.

Geoscience IDEA Scholarship (formerly AWG Minority Scholarship)	The Geoscience Inclusion, Diversity, Equality, and Accessibility (IDEA) Scholarship program encourages women from under-served communities to pursue an education and career in the Geosciences or Earth Sciences. The scholarship annually provides up to \$5000 in awards, typically split between two or more undergraduate students, and matches them with AWG mentors to enhance their careers. It also includes a one-year, sponsored AWG student membership.	6/30
