Advisor's Guide to a Student Organizational Plan for College Admissions & Financial Aid







This binder system can be used with high school seniors to help them stay organized during the college and financial aid application process.

Purpose: Help students create and maintain a senior year binder to prepare and stay organized. The binder will contain personal information about admissions, financial aid, scholarships, etc.

Materials: 3-ring binder, 10 Tabs

Binder Contents:

- 1. College list.
- 2. Usernames and passwords for each college.
- 3. Verification copies of submitted college applications.
- 4. Record of college entrance and placement exams.
- 5. Scholarship list and verification copies.
- 6. Copy of essays and personal statement.
- 7. FAFSA/WASFA paper application, FSA ID, and Student Aid Report (SAR).
- 8. Credit check form.
- 9. Brag sheet (high school highlights).
- 10. Letter of recommendation and request forms.

Facilitation: Advisors should begin by providing each student with the templates for each section of their binders. You may wish to share the templates electronically so students may edit them.

Note: Feel free to customize any of the templates. Remind students to keep all this information secure and private.

Advisor's Notes

Instructions: Students should complete this form by entering the names of the institutions they plan to apply to. Students should be encouraged to apply to at least three colleges, one from within each of these three categories:

- **Reach** You might not get in, but it's worth applying because you really want to go. This may be a selective school.
- Solid You're a competitive applicant and will likely be accepted.
- Safety You'll definitely get accepted, and it's a backup in case the others don't work out.

Students can research the institutions online to find the application due dates and possible college contact. If you wish to assist with this task, consider using the <u>Washington Council for High School-College Relations (WCHSCR)</u> Higher Education and Counselor Workshop Book. This book is updated annually each September. It contains descriptions of two and four-year public and private, non-profit higher education institutions in Washington State. Find admission fees and deadlines, FAFSA deadlines, admission requirements, contacts, and more. Key Point: The student needs to find and list a college contact on this tracking form. Students need to feel like there is an adult at the institution who can help them. This individual could be a staff person in a TRiO office, a CAMP program, a multicultural outreach and recruitment admissions officer, disability support services contact, or another staff member who can serve as an ally and assist them when they have questions.

College Support Program Applications

Advisor's Notes

All enrolled students are automatically eligible to receive general student services. Some institutions also offer additional programs that provide a higher level of support. These typically require students to apply and meet specific eligibility requirements.

Students should research what programs are available at the institutions they are applying to. If they meet eligibility requirements, encourage students to apply to a support program.

Examples of Major Support Service Programs

TRiO Student Support Services (TRIO SSS)

- **Description:** The Student Support Services is a federal program that provides opportunities for academic development, assists students with basic college requirements, and motivates students to successfully complete their postsecondary education.
- Services Typically Provided: Academic advising, college transfer planning & university visits, cultural and social activities, financial aid & scholarship assistance, financial literacy education, mentoring, student mentors, tutoring, and workshops & learning opportunities.
- **Eligibility:** Eligibility includes, but is not limited to, the following (Note: an institution may have additional specifications).
- U.S. citizen or permanent resident
- One or more of the following:
 - A first-generation college student (neither parent has received a four-year college degree).
 - A student with limited income (according to federal standards).
 - A student with a disability.

College Assistant Migrant Program (CAMP)

- Website: <u>http://www.wsac.wa.gov/college-assistance-migrant-program</u>
- **Description:** CAMP is a federally funded program to assist first-year college students from migrant and seasonal farm worker families in pursuing higher education. CAMP offers pre-college transition and first-year assistance to help students develop the skills necessary to ensure continued enrollment and eventual graduation. In addition, the program provides support services to satisfy each participant's educational and personal needs.
- Services Typically Provided: Financial assistance and scholarships, academic assistance, peer mentoring, career planning services, college visits, cultural enrichment opportunities, and more.
- Eligibility: Freshman students from migrant and seasonal farm working backgrounds at the following institutions: University of Washington, Washington State University, Central Washington University, Eastern Washington University, Columbia Basin College, Wenatchee Valley College, and Heritage University. (As of 2019).

Passport for Careers Program

- **Description:** The Passport to Careers program helps students from foster care prepare for and succeed in college, apprenticeships, or pre-apprenticeship programs. Under the Passport to Careers program, there are two sub-programs:
 - Passport to College
 - Passport to Apprenticeship Opportunities

The Passport to Apprenticeship Opportunities program will assist students participating in registered apprenticeship or pre-apprenticeship programs by covering occupational-specific costs such as class tuition, fees, work clothes, rain gear, boots, and occupation-related tools. The Washington Student Achievement Council will work with non-governmental organizations to administer the Passport to Apprenticeship Opportunities program.

Services Typically Provided: Through the Passport to College program, students receive a scholarship that assists with the cost of attending college (tuition, fees, books, housing, transportation, and some personal expenses), support services from college staff, and priority consideration for the <u>Washington College Grant</u> and <u>State Work</u> Study programs.

- Eligibility:
 - \circ Have been in Washington state, federal, or tribal foster care after age 15.
 - Enroll at least half-time in an eligible college, apprenticeship, or preapprenticeship by their 22nd birthday.
 - Maintain Washington residency.
 - Not pursue a degree in theology.
 - Be working toward earning their first bachelor's degree, associate degree, certificate, pre-apprenticeship, or apprenticeship.
- Students can also contact the Passport Designated Support Staff person at their college to receive help navigating college.

Passport-eligible students looking for detailed information on preparing, applying, and paying for college, apprenticeship, or pre-apprenticeship programs can find more information in the <u>Passport to Careers Guide</u>.

MESA Community College Program (MCCP)

- Description: The MESA Community College Programs are the newest additions to Washington MESA's educational programs and services. Supported by funding from the Nation Science Foundation (NSF), WA MCCP aims to increase the number of underrepresented (African American, Native American, Latino, and Pacific Islander/Hawaiian) community college students who successfully transfer to four-year institutions and earn STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) bachelor's degrees.
- Services Included: Activities and support to help increase the number of traditionally underrepresented students receiving a bachelor's degree in a science, technology, engineering, or mathematics (STEM) discipline, including academic excellence workshops, orientation courses, academic and career advising, student professional development and

links to STEM societies, administrative support, and a MESA study center. The program also includes transfer support to the University of Washington and Washington State University.

• **Eligibility:** The MESA program recruits and retains a cohort of 60 students from enrolling in the program to the time they graduate and transfer to a four-year university. The students MESA serves must have the intent to transfer to a four-year university, come from a traditionally underrepresented group in the STEM fields, pursue a STEM major, and be financially and educationally disadvantaged.

Advisor's Notes

It can be helpful to share a paper copy of a college application with students before they begin completing the form online. Students can see what will be asked and start a rough draft in Microsoft Word. When they are ready, they can transfer the information to the electronic application and submit it online.

- Frequently Asked Questions during Application Completion.
- College Application Checklist, which resembles a blank college application.
- Application Personal Statement and Essay Tips.
- Contact information for Washington institutions.
- Information for undocumented students, youth in care, and more.
- Next steps.

NOTE: Encourage students to print a completed copy of their electronic application. If the application is not printer-friendly, encourage students to take a screenshot and save it for their records.

Washington Higher Education Residency Affidavit

(Also known as HB1079 Affidavit of Residency)

Advisor's Notes

Undocumented students (students without a Social Security Number) may be eligible to pay resident tuition rates if they meet all the following criteria:

- 1. Received a diploma from a Washington high school or the equivalent of a diploma in Washington State.
- 2. Lived in Washington for at least 3 calendar years (not school years) before receiving their diploma or equivalent.
- 3. Continuously resided in Washington since receiving the high school diploma or equivalent.

Students who meet all the above criteria are required to provide the Admissions Office with a completed Washington Higher Education Residency Affidavit verifying that they will file an application to become a U.S. Permanent Resident as soon as possible.

These students may wish to keep a copy for their records. After the information is shared with the college, the form is destroyed, and the information is kept confidential.

Remind students to keep this information secure and private.

Washington State Higher Education Residency Affidavit

Students who are not eligible for federal financial aid due to immigration status Submit a residency affidavit through the Washington Application for State Financial Aid (WASFA) at readysetgrad.wa.gov/wasfa.

Students who are eligible for federal financial aid due to citizenship or immigration status Submit a hard copy of this affidavit—with an original signature on page 2—to your school. Schools will not accept emailed or faxed forms.

Background

Washington House Bill 1079 passed in 2003. It allows students who are eligible to sign this affidavit to pay in-state (resident) tuition and fees at public institutions (RCW 288.15.012(2)(e)).

Advisor's Notes

Advisors can help students find and apply for scholarships. One of the best places a student can look for scholarships is on thewashboard.org. This website is a free, web-based scholarship matching service for Washington students. The Washington Scholarship Coalition, a public/private partnership of foundations, non-profit organizations, and state agencies, supports it. This website makes it easy to find and apply for scholarships and is spam-free. Have students create a profile or update an existing one. TheWashBoard.org finds the best potential scholarship based on its self-created student profile. Users can also find scholarships that do not require a Social Security Number or ask about citizenship status.

Additionally, you may provide them with a list of already compiled scholarships. Washington State GEAR UP maintains a listing available to schools for 7th-12th graders. Many of the listings do not have citizenship requirements. Almost all these listings are annual scholarships. See: http://gearup.wa.gov/resources/scholarships.

Or encourage them to check out <u>The Scholarship Junkies Scholarship Bank</u>. Sign up and have them send you scholarships to your email every month.

Advisor's Notes

It can be helpful to share a paper copy of a college or scholarship application with students before they begin completing the form online. Students can see what will be asked, start a rough draft, and then transfer and submit it online.

FAFSA/WASFA Paper Application, FSA ID, & SAR

Advisor's Notes

It can be helpful to share a paper copy of the FAFSA or WASFA with students before they begin completing the form online. Students can see what will be asked, start a rough draft, and then transfer and submit it online.

Additionally, the Application Print Summary is available at the end of the application after the final check has passed successfully. The FAFSA must first be completed to access the Print Summary. Have students print a copy for their records.

Remind students to keep this information secure and private.

FAFSA

- FAFSA on the Web automatically e-mails the "Confirmation Page" to the student if they provide a student e-mail address in his/her application. Applicants should check their spam or junk folders for the confirmation page if a student e-mail address is provided, but the e-mail confirmation is not received.
- NOTE: Encourage students to save and print a copy of their Confirmation Page for their records. Students should record their FSA ID info on the Username and Password Tracking Form.

Student Aid Report (SAR)

- After students submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), they will get a Student Aid Report that summarizes the information they provided on the FAFSA.
- Have students review their Student Aid Report carefully to ensure it's correct and complete. If they do not have any changes to make to the information listed on the SAR, have them keep it for their records.
- NOTE: Whether you receive your SAR online or on paper depends on whether you provide an e-mail address on your FAFSA. If you provide a valid e-mail address, you'll receive an e-mail with instructions on accessing an online copy of your SAR.
